**PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS, crime continues to be a serious problem in the nation and California; and

WHEREAS, without the cooperation of citizens, law enforcement officers can accomplish little in their efforts to control crime; and

WHEREAS, citizens can do much to make themselves and their homes and working places less vulnerable to crime, without giving up their rights to live at peace in their communities; and

WHEREAS, the State of California has encouraged crime resistance campaigns to make citizens more aware of ways they can limit opportunities for crime by becoming partners with law enforcement officers to implement proven crime prevention measures; and

WHEREAS, block clubs and other neighborhood groups throughout the nation and the State have organized to help resist crime in their communities; and

WHEREAS, successful local crime resistance programs involving citizen volunteers, community leaders and law enforcement officers need to be publicly recognized so their effective methods can be better shared; and

WHEREAS, California's observance of "Crime Prevention Week" will focus public attention on the responsibility of all citizens to help combat crime;

NOW THEREFORE, I, EDMUND G. BROWN, Jr., Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the State of California, do hereby proclaim the week of February 7-13, 1982, as "Crime Prevention Week" and urge all Californians to participate in crime prevention activities.
