

AGENDA ITEM: Statewide Information Databases

RECOMMENDED MOTION FOR CONSIDERATION BY THE BOARD: I move that the Library of California Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to allocate FY 1998/99 Library of California funds not to exceed \$350,000 for support of the Environmental Information Program at the Mid-Range model identified in the CDL/LoC Environmental Information Project: California Digital Library Technologies Report, September 10, 1999 (Exhibit A). The CEO is directed to investigate potential sites for this program and to report back to the Board as to its disposition at its February meeting.

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY:

The California Digital Library (CDL)/Library of California (LoC) Access to Environmental Information Project (EIP) began in March 1998 funded under LSTA. Goals for the demonstration project were 1) to show the economic and intellectual benefits that can accrue through collaboration between the LoC and the CDL and 2) to explore the technological, organizational, and financial infrastructure issues involved in delivering electronic content through the CDL to participants in the LoC.

The Evaluation Report (Exhibit B) from the CDL indicates success in demonstrating the value of collaboration between the LoC and the CDL and in identifying critical issues in the development of a topical web site.

Recommendations include improving outreach efforts to the user and maintaining communication throughout the project with them. Participation by LoC regional members in this activity is important in generating sufficient usage and benefit to justify the costs involved.

The licensing component showed clear monetary benefit (\$85,000 savings realized) if compared to the costs of individual subscriptions. Authentication and authorization of users was problematic and time consuming, as is the case with the RAND California trial.

Ongoing state support of this program allows further knowledge to be gained on the development of topical web sites and provides another mechanism for promoting the LoC and increasing participation from libraries of all types, and continues an online service that has been deemed extremely useful by project participants. Funding will transition from LSTA to LoC funds.

The estimated cost for establishing the Environmental Information Project (EIP) at the mid-range model estimated in the CDL Environmental Information Project --California Digital Library Technologies Report, September 10, 1999 (Exhibit A), is as follows:

Assumptions:

- That a site for co-hosting the resource can be found, with sufficient telecommunications access, floor space, and technical staff to adequately install and maintain the hardware and software resources required by the project.
- That sufficient software expertise is available in the applications used by the site. If this expertise is not available an additional training cost should be factored into the budget.

- That a librarian who is experienced in environmental specialties is available for the project. While it is not mandatory that the librarian be on-site, it would be helpful if the librarian were in the same region as the site, preferably not more than 1-2 hours away by car. If the librarian is further away, additional costs for travel and related expenses must be included.

Included are excerpts from the technologies report (Exhibit A), evaluation report (Exhibit B) and the complete final report on the project from the CDL (Exhibit C).

GENERAL OVERALL PROGRAM UPDATES:

CURRENT STATUS:

A. RAND California trial database project

A report on the current participants in the RAND California database trial is included (Exhibit D) for your review. A listing of participants by city follows this text (page 7) and a listing by library type is included as Exhibit E. To date there are over 300 registrants and more than 1000 libraries involved. Registrations show broad participation by libraries of all types. Approximately \$200,000 of the \$500,000 allocated has been paid to RAND.

Promotion of the project is continued by contacts with Regional Planning groups, professional associations and response to inquiries. Valuable knowledge about registration procedures, authentication issues and program promotion has been gathered so far. Participants will be surveyed on their usage of the database, source of knowledge about the program and suggestions for future activities. RAND will also furnish data on use of the database. We are developing criteria for a follow up license to take effect upon the July 30, 2000 expiration date that would transition to costs being paid by participating libraries. Eligibility for participation would be either the interim criteria for regions not formally organized or membership for regions that have formed.

B. Encyclopedia Britannica license agreement

On October 19th *Encyclopedia Britannica* announced a change in their product. Contents of the encyclopedia will now be available for free, but with advertising as part of the information display. Other versions of the database product will be available, free of advertising, that offer other features not available on the free version.

As a result of this change staff have not proceeded with securing a statewide license. Once the impact of these changes is better known staff can evaluate whether the library community would invite a statewide license arrangement.

C. Library of California Periodicals/Serials database

A LoC grant has been awarded to continue the work of the Serials Service Bureau for fiscal year 99/00. Staff met with Laine Farley of the CDL on October 13th and will meet with staff from the serials service bureau vendor to review current database activities.

This past July staff mailed surveys to 834 contributing libraries—composed mostly of public, community college, and some special libraries—that had regularly contributed their serial records to be included in the California Database of Serials (CDB-S) database. The updated serial records from CDB-S are eventually added to the Library of California Periodicals/Serials database, which is part of the Periodicals file of MELVYL, the online catalog of the CDL. The results of the survey are included as Exhibit F.

The purpose of the survey was to find out the number of contributing libraries having automated library catalog systems, the display characteristics of the serial records in these libraries' online catalogs, and the importance of output products (printed local serial publications lists, for example) still being available for purchase even if serial records can be accessed electronically through the Internet. Staff has also included comments from survey respondents who think output products should continue, and from respondents having general comments about the database.

Staff received 275 survey responses, a 33% response rate from the survey. Public, academic, and special libraries comprised the bulk of the respondents at 40, 25, and 33 percent respectively. Almost three-fourths of the survey respondents (71%) have a local automated system; many of these are systems by major library automation vendors. About 60% of the respondents, 216 libraries, responded to the question regarding output products; of this group 75% responded that output products were either not as important or not as necessary given the availability of electronic access; 25% responded that they remain important.

Although the survey results are not definitive, they do suggest that a majority of the libraries contributing serial publications records to CDB-S have online catalogs in their libraries, that the serial records in these catalogs are in machine-readable form, and that printed subsets of the database are becoming increasingly unnecessary if the library has electronic access to the library.

The CDL is undertaking an RFP process for the MELVYL system. Results of this change in systems may provide new opportunities for handling remote entry of serials data from contributing libraries. Staff will continue to consider options for production of the database and will analyze the workflow of the service bureau and investigate improvements.

The CDL's usage statistics indicate that the LoC Periodicals/Serials database comprises about seven percent of all queries of all the CDL databases. To improve recognition of the database as a product of the LoC (in collaboration with the CDL) staff plan to implement a short-term marketing campaign to strengthen this identification and to

promote increased usage. This marketing campaign would utilize electronic as well as print methods to reach library directors, branch managers and staff. Specific activities will include the production of bookmarks, signage, brochures and media releases to library publications and newsletters. Handouts will accompany staff when discussing the LoC Periodicals/Serials database in presentations to library organizations, teachers and others. Electronic marketing will include use of e-mail and the creation of a graphic used to link the CDL web site for the database. This graphic will be distributed free to libraries to use on their web pages to link to the service. Statistics from the CDL will be used to measure the impact of the campaign.

D. Statewide Information Database Licensing

On October 5th staff met with the Negotiator's Advisory Committee to solicit recommendations for trial databases and to share results of the RAND trial.

Advisory committee members suggested a comprehensive study of consortial licensing activities in other states. Experience from the RAND trial indicates a need for better information on potential participation in consortial agreements. Close communication, cooperation and coordination with these libraries is essential to identify suitable products for statewide agreements and to clarify the principles to guide negotiations and the responsibility and authority of all concerned. Fiscal arrangements for purchases need to provide maximum leverage for favorable rates from vendors while at the same time meeting the differing schedules and constraints of different types of library organizations.

The proposed study, with an estimated cost of approximately \$50,000 would look to other states' practices in a multi-type environment for examples of specific practices that address these issues. Additional information on the number of libraries in California interested in participation in statewide agreements will also be gathered to aid in the negotiation of favorable pricing structures.

Staff continues to assess interest in full text periodical databases for trial and licensing arrangements and are exploring possible pilot projects. Staff has discussed the implementation of a full text database license pilot and we are exploring interest from the regional representatives for this concept to be implemented in one of the regions.

Staff is also exploring interest in Countrywatch.com, (<http://www.countrywatch.com>) a provider of political, economic and business information for over 190 countries. The site consists of web based country reviews and a country specific wire service. Content of the database does contain advertising, but it excludes services and products that are potentially offensive. Staff is obtaining more information about pricing and will submit a recommendation at the February meeting. We would offer this as a database license to be paid by participating libraries but coordinated through a single fiscal agent.

Information databases developed by the library community such as Job Star and Librarians' Index to the Internet are also being considered for development and support from the LoC as part of statewide programs.

The web site as discussed in the conceptual design document will be used as a tool for the database licensing process. We are exploring a partnership with the CDL as well as other organizations as a potential method to develop the site.

RELATED ISSUES TO COME BEFORE THE BOARD IN THE FUTURE:

Status reports on the RAND California trial, the Library of California Periodicals/Serials database promotion effort, and study of consortial licensing arrangements will be presented to the Board at the February meeting.



Comments regarding “extremely important” answers:

“Our Internet connection is not completely reliable”; “sometimes it is just easier to look in a book in hand than log on . . .”

“Need local lists for curricular needs”

“... still quickest and easiest to use a hard copy directory of local library magazine holdings first ...” Library goes online if it can’t find title in local lists first.

Library only has staff terminals to access online databases – output products need to be used until library has patron access terminals

Access to specialized local subset collection (e.g. SCALL Union List) is more convenient than online access because browsing a print listing identifies “pertinent materials for research and collection development.”

NOCALL union list is created from California Database for Serials (CDB-S/CULP). Printed subset list is easier and faster to use for finding information and ILLs in local area.

Response from 2 public libraries – only have a small number of public access computer terminals, so printed subset serial publication lists are needed to serve patrons

“We do not have enough access to rely only on electronic formats. It is great to have this database, but sometimes more local lists are faster and more convenient for the customer.”

“Print is almost always accessible, even when networks are down, or a computer is otherwise engaged.”

“The local serials list will be important to us until at least one on-line display screen provides the assigned database record.” [*I think the respondent is referring to all CULP records being in MARC format*]

“Faster access for ready reference questions.”

“One of the major tools I use when ordering ILL’s is the Lending Policy codes. I can’t find this information in the on-line database. Without that information the database is almost useless to me. If that information was provided, I probably wouldn’t need the hard copy at all.” *[The field testers discussed this when evaluating the prototype LoCPSD database. The idea at the time was having the LoCPSD website provide a link to the ILL loaning policies on the loaning library’s website]*

“Patrons often use the printed edition ... to scan available locations for periodical holdings. Patrons can scan independently while Internet access must be mediated by a librarian, or, requires extensive instruction.” *[With a little bit of instruction patrons should have no trouble using LoCPSD, especially if librarians have cheat sheets next to the patron use computer terminals. Librarians will need to be familiar with the database in case patrons ask questions or can’t find the title they want.]*

“We are concerned that not all private libraries will be accessible through the database; these are the kinds of libraries that often have the industry specific holdings we need to borrow, but they are typically not open to the public.”

“Unable to get local holdings [community college library]”

“Only on a temporary basis until we have enough staff Internet terminals.... In [the] meantime, we prefer to use printed lists (BALIS list, lists from other consortia and individual libraries)”

General Notes/Comments from survey respondents

Notes:

54 survey respondents marked both “summary” and “detailed holdings” to Question 4b, 5b, or both.

In one public library serials are cataloged, but not periodicals; in another only annuals and continuations are in MARC format

Survey respondent answers to question 6b may not be reliable because it is not clear whether the “No” responses indicated that the particular library did not have Z39.50 client software, or whether that particular library preferred using their own client to search the California Periodicals Database.

Comments from survey respondents:

LoCPSD as it appears on MELVYL needs to be fully functional – survey respondent (public library from L.A. region) could not access serial publications when using the “Region 4” limiting command; all the searches failed. Display screens for LoCPSD need to be simplified; survey respondent thought they looked “too busy”

“No Internet access at library yet, but expect to become online in April 2000 via Gates Foundation grant. At that time library will assess online periodical databases including LoCPSD.”

“The database needs to included Lending Policy codes like the microfiche does. For ILL purposes it is very important that we quickly access the price for copies without having to call the holding library each time.” [See similar comment on page 4 and response]
