*Senate Joint Resolution No. 21—Relative to  
the division of the state.*

1 *Resolved by the Senate and Assembly of the State of Cali-*  
2 *fornia, jointly,* That the Legislature of the State of California  
3 respectfully requests the Congress of the United States to  
4 grant its consent, pursuant to Section 3 of Article IV of the  
5 United States Constitution, to the formation of two new states  
6 within the State of California effective on submission to, and  
7 approval by, the Congress of a Constitution for each of the  
8 new states, the dividing line between the two new states to be  
9 as follows:

10 Beginning at the intersection of the westerly boundary of  
11 the County of Ventura with the Pacific Ocean; thence north-  
12 erly along said last mentioned boundary to the point at which  
13 it intersects with the boundary of the County of Kern; thence  
14 easterly along the southern boundary of the County of Kern  
15 to the point at which such boundary intersects with the  
16 boundary of the County of San Bernardino; thence northerly  
17 along the eastern boundary of the County of Kern to the point  
18 at which it intersects with the County of Inyo; and thence  
19 easterly along the common boundary of the County of Inyo  
20 and the County of San Bernardino to the point at which it  
21 intersects with the eastern boundary of the State of Cali-  
22 fornia; and be it further

23 *Resolved,* That the Secretary of the Senate be hereby di-  
24 rected to transmit copies of this resolution to the President  
25 and Vice President of the United States, to the Speaker of  
26 the House of Representatives, and to each Senator and Repre-  
27 sentative from California in the Congress of the United States.
