

Sustainable California Libraries Projects Announced, Climate Action Guide Posted

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[Sacramento, Calif.] — Eight California libraries will host more climate education, climate resilience, and community engagement projects this year, as part of the third round of the Sustainable California Libraries grant program.

Activities planned for the 2024-2025 project period include community conversations, hands-on and educational workshops on topics such as composting, preserving food, and energy efficiency, creation or expansion of Libraries of Things, fix-it fairs, mending workshops, author visits, nature journaling, wellness walks, pollinator-friendly gardening, community tree planting, bike repair, disaster preparedness, and staff training on sustainable practices.

Community partners and local experts include bike coalitions, Master Gardeners, neighborhood organizations, affordable housing creators, tribal communities, wildlife, biodiversity and tree focused nonprofits, first responders, public works, environmental services, and sustainability departments as well as local garden, home repair, and education organizations and businesses.

"Libraries are trusted messengers that can help change community behavior in ways other government agencies can't, "said Greg Lucas, California's State Librarian. "These grants help public libraries reduce their carbon footprint and work with local partners to build and share community sustainability solutions."

Grants were awarded to libraries in Inyo, Los Angeles, Marin, Orange, San Diego, San Mateo, and Santa Barbara counties. A list of the upcoming Sustainable California Libraries projects is posted at www.library.ca.gov/services/to-libraries/sustainable/.

To help libraries and the communities they serve do even more, a Climate and Sustainability Action Guide for California Libraries was developed by the Alliance for Library Impact, in partnership with Pacific Library Partnership. While California libraries have made great strides in offering sustainable programming to their communities, the Action Guide provides options for taking it to the next level for libraries to be sustainable institutions themselves, from steps like offering digital checkout receipts to adding sustainability and climate resilience to strategic plans.

About the State Library: Established in 1850, the California State Library is the central reference and research library for state government and the legislature.
