29	REPORTS TO THE BOARD
30	Board President's Report
31	Board President Connie Williams reported that California School Library
32	Association (CSLA) continues to work on AB 535, which was not funded at the
33	time of meeting. Williams briefly spoke about the potential positive impact of this
34	bill on school communities, particularly the need for teacher librarians. Williams
35	spoke about the bill's development, with consideration of AI bills and the Model

School Library Standards.

Vice President's Report

Vice President Anne Bernardo updated the Board on the challenges faced by California's public law libraries, particularly the ongoing issues related to funding. Bernardo noted that efforts are being made to secure additional resources to support these institutions, which are crucial for access to justice. Bernardo also shared insights from her continued monitoring of national library trends through participation in American Library Association, California Library Association, and regional library calls-to-action.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

State Librarian Greg Lucas provided an overview of the State Library's activities since the last board meeting. Lucas briefly discussed the continued work of maintaining the level of local assistance provided and ensuring the State Library's services to California residents and state employees can continue.

Board president Williams thanked Lucas for his recent presentation to the Board of Education.

Zip Books Grant Program Report

California State Library Grants and Bureau Operation Manager Annly Roman provided an overview of the Zip Books program structure and shared an update on the program, which continues to be a vital resource for underserved communities across California. Roman highlighted the program's success in delivering timely and cost-effective access to books in areas where traditional library services are limited. In the 2022-23 fiscal year, total money requested was over the budgeted amount, so awards given to the 96 requesting programs were adjusted based on each program's LIPC (Local income Per Capita) level. For the 2023-24 fiscal year, the program has expanded to include 99 library programs out of 186 jurisdictions. Final reports from the library programs for the -2023-24 fiscal year will be due on July 31, 2024. Applications for the upcoming fiscal year are open and will close June 12, 2024. Application orientations are being held so that programs have opportunities to discuss the program and any questions about the application process. Roman mentioned that the program's future depends on the final approval of the State Budget, with \$1 million allocated for the next fiscal year.

CALIFORNIA LIBRARY SERVICES ACT

BUDGET AND PLANNING

Library Services Act Preliminary Budget for FY 2024-2025

The Board reviewed the preliminary budget for the 2024-25 fiscal year, as outlined in Document 2. California State Library Grants and Bureau Operation

Manager Annly Roman spoke about the Governor's proposed budget, which includes a proposal to provide \$3.63 million in funding for the California Library Services Act program and \$1 million for the Zip Books program. Document 2 contains projected allocations, divided up by the current CLSA allocation formula. Roman shared that the Department of Finance posted a revision letter proposing to reduce the annual allocation to CLSA by \$1.75 million, leaving \$1.88 million to be allocated to the cooperative libraries systems. Roman stated that the suggested reduction was not incorporated into any budget bills at the time of Board meeting but was the most current information. Roman shared this information so that the Board understood what their options were for potential action items, and CLSA Coordinator and Analyst Monica Rivas restated the potential action items with the specific numbers provided in the Board packet.

Board member Weissman asked if action to approve based on the reduced allocation would cause that reduced allocation to be included in the finalized budget. Roman responded that the Department of Finance receives a copy of all Board actions. Weissman also asked if the Board would be meeting before the start of the 2024-25 fiscal year. Rivas responded that the next meeting of the Board will be in fall 2024, at which the Board will approve the final budget.

Board member Murguia asked if it is possible for a motion to include the \$3.63 million and/or the budgeted amount in the adopted budget. Roman responded that it is possible to state a motion that includes approval of the \$3.63 million allocation, language that reflects that this number is contingent upon passage of the finalized budget, and language that includes approval of what the updated allocation may be in the finalized budget.

It was moved and seconded (Murguia/Weissman) and carried with seven ayes and one abstention (Maghsoudi) that the California Library Services Board approve contingent upon the passage of the State Budget Act, the 2024-2025 CLSA budget as directed in the proposed 2024-2025 budget, totaling \$3,630,000, or the appropriated allocation in the final 2024-2025 budget, for allocation to Cooperative Library Systems.

Board member Bernardo shared the need for a second action item for the Zip Books program. Roman restated the current process for the Zip Books allocations. Rivas restated the amount currently in the budget.

It was further moved and seconded (Tauler/ Bernardo) and carried with seven ayes and one abstention (Maghsoudi) that the California Library Services Board approve, contingent upon the passage of the

State Budget Act, the \$1 million allocated in the 2024-2025 budget to invest in the Zip Books program to ensure timely and cost-effective access to information in California's hard-to-reach and underserved communities.

RESOURCE SHARING

Annual Report for FY 2022-2023

The Board reviewed the System Annual Report for the 2022-23 fiscal year, as outlined in Document 3. The report highlighted key achievements, including successful collaborative initiatives between library systems. CLSA Coordinator and Analyst Monica Rivas explained the Annual Report and how the budget for the 2022-23 fiscal year contributed to the expansion of library programming, particularly digital resources.

Correction to 2023-2024 Population and Membership Figures

The Board discussed the need to update the population and membership figures for the Santiago Library System Cooperative, as outlined in Document 4. It was noted that the previous figures were inaccurate and required correction to ensure proper representation and funding allocation.

Library Withdrawal from System Cooperative

The Board addressed the withdrawal of Palo Verde Valley District Library from the Inland Library System Cooperative, as outlined in Document 5. The reasons for withdrawal were discussed, including the impact on both the library and the cooperative system.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Overview of Legislation Affecting Libraries FY 2024-2025

State Librarian Lucas provided an update on legislative issues impacting California libraries, particularly focusing on how the potential budget change impacted funding for Career Pathways, BrainFuse, and the proposed rollback of \$131 million from the Building Forward Library Facilities Improvement Program funds. These cuts, proposed in the Governor's budget, could severely affect infrastructure projects and digital access in libraries, especially in underserved communities.

Board member Weissman requested that information about specific programs that will be eliminated under the proposed budget be provided. Lucas said that information would be provided.

Board member Bernardo asked for clarification about the legislative developments regarding the State Library grants portal. Lucas explained the interest from outside groups and agencies in changing the grants portal, and explained why it is not likely to happen.

Lucas gave a brief overview of federal developments, specifically regarding the upcoming opportunity for renewal of the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) budget.

BOARD DISCUSSION ITEMS FY 2024-2025

Strategies and Legislative Goals

 The Board engaged in a focused discussion on their advocacy strategies and legislative goals for the upcoming fiscal year, with consideration for concerns over the proposed state budget cuts.

Board President Williams raised for discussion ways for the Board to advocate to policymakers about the value and importance of libraries. Williams mentioned Board member Weissman's experience speaking with legislators and Board member Lau's opportunity to speak with State Parks about library and cultural initiatives. Williams suggested the Board consider visits to local offices of state and federal elected officials. Williams suggested developing talking points and scheduling meetings within a shared timeframe to allow Board members to report back.

Weissman appreciated the idea and expressed interest in participating in her local offices.

Lau serves on the board of the California State Parks Foundation and spoke about advocacy experience through that service. Lau spoke about the potential impact of joining forces with other organizations, interest groups, and lobbyists.

Weissman spoke about a conversation she had with Senate Majority Leader Lena Gonzalez about libraries state budget. Weissman plans to speak with legislators about library interest and welcomes any talking points that can be shared.

Williams requested development of talking points on Institute of Museum and Library Services and on state funded library programs, particularly BrainFuse and Career Pathways. Williams asked that State Library staff assist in scheduling meetings with policymakers. Murguia suggested that Board members might better be able to schedule for themselves.

Weissman requested that talking points include specific information on budget data, particularly cuts to library program as a result of budget cuts.

Weissman asked about when talking points and data might be received. State Librarian Greg Lucas said information would be gathered quickly and should not take long to deliver.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no public comment brought forward.

OLD BUSINESS

Palm Desert Library Affiliation Update

State Librarian Lucas provided an update on the Palm Desert Library's affiliation with the Inland Library System, confirming that the California State Library received Ordinance-1408, completing the process. The Board expressed satisfaction with the progress and welcomed Palm Desert Library to the cooperative system.

Update on Administrative Assistant II Position

Deputy State Librarian Wendt updated the Board on the hiring process for the Administrative Assistant II position, noting that first interview process was unsuccessful and that the position posting would be reopened. Board President Williams will serve as Board representation in the hiring process.

Update on CLSA Forms

CSL Grants and Bureau Operation Manager Annly Roman provided an update on the new CLSA forms used for reporting, highlighting improvements in the submission process and data-gathering questions, and the feedback received from participants. Roman also discussed the move to a new grant management system, AmpliFund.

Roman also shared that, because of the changes to the forms for Plans for Service, the deadline for submission has been extended to August 1, 2024.

AGENDA BUILDING

Board Vacancies

Board member Weissman discussed potentially including an agenda item regarding recruitment for Board vacancies. CSL Grants and Bureau Operation Manager Annly Roman provided a list of vacancies in the meeting chat.

Advocacy Materials Development

Board member Weissman asked about resources and information for patrons to advocate for the Library, and suggested including an agenda item to discuss the development of these materials. Board President Williams mentioned existing American Library Association resources, and Weissman suggested these materials be shared on the Board or Library webpage. State Librarian Lucas shared that an attendee mentioned in the meeting chat that the California Library Association has advocacy materials, and that EveryLibrary has materials as well. Board member Murguia mentioned existing resources on the California State Library website.
