# Purpose, Co-Design, and Equity



- Programs must support the LSTA Five-Year Plan
- Programs must be Equity-Centered
- The co-design process: Programs and services are designed together with community members, instead of making decisions for community members.
- Equity-based community-involvement: how the project has been designed and will be implemented in collaboration with the focus population(s) that your project(s) targets.

## New Uniform Guidance Updates



The Federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) has revised the OMB Guidance for Grants and Agreements. These updates are intended to address statutory requirements and administration priorities, reduce agency and recipient burden, and rewrite certain sections with plain language, improved flow, and consistency in terminology.

The [LSTA Application Guide](#) reflects the changes relating to application content and the application process. Successful applicants will receive an application agreement that reflects applicable updates.

# New Uniform Guidance Updates

## Key Changes



Some key changes in areas that directly impact awardees. Please note we are not able to provide legal guidance or interpretation pertaining to these regulatory updates. If you have questions, please reach out via email: [LSTAGrants@library.ca.gov](mailto:LSTAGrants@library.ca.gov)

- **Cybersecurity** must be incorporated into internal control policies and procedures
- Priority to purchase **products and services that can be reused, refurbished, or recycled, are biobased, are energy and water efficient**
- Informing employees of recipients and subrecipients of **whistleblower rights** and protections in writing
- **New certification statement** for subrecipients that must be submitted when applying for funds, requesting payment, submitting financial reports
- **Increased equipment threshold** value from \$5,000 to \$10,000
- Modified Total Direct Cost (**MTDC**) **ceiling raised** from \$25,000 to \$50,000
- **De minimis indirect cost rate increased** from 10% to 15%
- The State Library is required to **confirm that potential subrecipients aren't suspended, debarred, or excluded from receiving Federal funding**

# New LSTA Application Guide

# General LSTA Eligibility



Projects must:

- Contribute to the achievement of the State Library's current LSTA five-year plan.
- Adhere to federal restrictions on LSTA funding
- Comply with the Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

Public libraries applying for funds must have completed:

- The most recent Public Libraries Survey
- The Cultural Heritage Disaster Preparedness Survey

# Application Process



- Applications open: January 8, 2025
- Grant opportunities close: March 12, 2025, at 12:00 noon
- Grant period begins: July 1, 2025
- Grant period ends: June 30, 2026

Awards will be made after IMLS funding levels are confirmed for California and the State budget has passed.

Successful applicants can expect to receive project funds up to 8 to 10 weeks after the payment claim form is received by the State Library.

Applications will be completed and submitted online using the California State Library's new online grant management system, AmpliFund.

# Application Review Scoring



- Detailed review criteria are available to applicants in the application instructions.
- Reviewers will use the following scale to rate how well individual questions in the proposal are answered:
  - Yes, fully (3 points)
  - Yes, adequately (2 points)
  - Yes, but insufficiently (1 point)
  - No (0 points)

Points assigned by reviewers are one part of a holistic grant review and are not the sole factor determining reviewers' decisions. Scores will also be used to inform the support provided to agencies that submit successful applications.

# Application Review

## Other Considerations



To help ensure California communities have the library services and programs they need to thrive, the State Library's Five Year Plan for Grantmaking centers on equity. If we receive more strong applications than we can support, we will prioritize funding projects that:

- Deliver innovative programs and services directly to Californians.
- Support libraries and communities that have not received LSTA grants in the last five years.
- Support communities with higher poverty rates as measured by the California Poverty Measure (CPM).
- Support libraries with a low Local Income Per Capita (LIPC).

# Support for Grantees



- The State Library will provide a support team for successful applicants, including:
  - **Grant Monitor:** support program compliance and reporting.
  - **Library Programs Consultant:** support project development.
  - **Equity Advisor:** support the design and delivery of equitable programs and services through the lifecycle of successful projects.



# Community Impact Grants



## Community Impact Grants:

- Contribute to the achievement of Goal One in the California State Library's Five-Year State Plan for LSTA 2023-2027:  
*Strengthen the ability of California libraries to design equitable programs and services in collaboration with their local communities.*
- Include library programming activities or support the development of new library services.
- Two types of projects: local and collaborative projects.
  - ✦ Local projects funding request range: \$10,000-\$100,000
  - ✦ Collaborative projects funding request range: \$50,000-\$250,000

# Play for All Overview



**Play is essential to a young child's development.**



The Play for All funding opportunity provides grants to help California libraries design and create welcoming family play spaces and offer meaningful programming around play for young children ages zero to eight.

The purpose of these grants is to support libraries in addressing the barriers and inequitable access to quality play spaces and play-based programming young children may encounter in communities that are experiencing marginalization, are under-resourced, and are underserved.

# Play for All Project Details



California libraries can apply for grant funding to support:

- Staff time to co-design, coordinate, and implement programs
- Purchases of mobile and/or child-friendly furnishings, manipulatives, and materials to create play spaces for ages 0 to 8
- Services from community organizations
- Participation in professional development workshops
- Outreach and promotion of play resources and programs
- Any additional allowable expenditures that help libraries provide young children access to play

Programs and play spaces funded by this grant must be open to the public.

# Play for All Project Details, cont.



The State Library welcomes applications from libraries that offer play programs onsite and/or at locations other than library sites. Options to provide this service at locations other than the library include:

- Outreach visits
- Creating opportunities for the focus population to come to the library where the play space and/or programs are
- Long-term checkout period of play programming materials

## Evaluation

Successful applicants will be required to survey participants to measure the impact of their programs. Questions will be provided.

- California public libraries and nonprofit organizations supporting these libraries, such as Friends groups and library cooperative systems
- California academic libraries and nonprofit organizations supporting these libraries, such as Friends groups
- Minimum funding request: **\$10,000**
- Maximum funding request: **\$75,000**

# Sustainable California Libraries Project Details Part 1



Projects *may* include:

- Climate education programs, including climate change as a public health issue
- Citizen science and conservation programs
- Environment-focused civic engagement programs
- Programs and services that support local climate resilience, mitigation and adaptation

Projects *must* include public programming, outreach, and at least one project partner or community connection in place by the time of application.

# Sustainable California Libraries Project Details Part 2



Successful past projects have included grant funding to support:

- Staff time to co-design, coordinate, and implement projects.
- Supplies to support programs.
- Services from community organizations.
- Outreach, promotion and community engagement specific to the project.
- Evaluation of project activities and outcomes.
- Scholarships for community members participating in educational and workforce development activities as part of the project.
- Internships for time spent directly on project related activities.
- Participation in professional development specific to the project.
- Staff time and travel costs to attend an in-state conference to share.

# Sustainable California Libraries Commitment, Funding, Peer Review



Project staff funded through this opportunity commit to:

- Community of Practice virtual sessions (estimated 5-6 sessions).
- Recorded Ignite Talks (virtual) in June 2026 to share promising practices and stories with the library community.

This opportunity is open to California public libraries and nonprofit organizations supporting libraries, such as Friends groups, and library cooperative systems

- Minimum funding request: **\$10,000**
- Maximum funding request: **\$75,000**

Applications for this opportunity will be reviewed by a panel of Peer Reviewers that includes library staff from across the state.

# Teens Succeed Purpose



This opportunity provides grant funding for teen internships in an out-of-school time environment and related costs.

The purpose of this grant is to address the challenges teens face in the aftereffects of the pandemic and to help prepare youth for success in life.

Applications should demonstrate an understanding of community needs, aspirations, and assets. Public programming, outreach, and at least one project partner or community connection is required.

# Teens Succeed Allowable Costs



Libraries can apply for grant funding to conduct the following types of activities:

- Salaries for library staff to manage, mentor and develop the teen interns and internships.
- Wages for the teen interns.
- Supplies needed to carry out programming.
- Outreach and promotion of project programs.
- Social emotional learning curriculum.
- Other project activities that are integral and necessary for the completion of project goals.

# Teens Succeed Supports and Outcomes



Project staff funded through this opportunity make a commitment to:

- Connect and engage with communities that are experiencing marginalization, are under-resourced, and are underserved
- Participate in virtual Community of Practice meetings
- Attend professional development trainings
- Participate in recorded, virtual Ignite Talks in June 2026

Minimum funding request: **\$50,000**

Maximum funding request: **\$100,000**

# eBooks for All Overview



eBooks for All is a statewide initiative to help local libraries meet the informational and recreational reading needs of their community. It unites all participating California libraries in a shared ecosystem of eBooks. This, in effect, allows for libraries to all borrow, seamlessly, from a shared “Statewide” collection.

The project uses the Palace reader and marketplace. Palace is an eBook aggregator that can retrieve books from multiple sources and present those materials to the user in a singular place.

# eBooks for All Purpose



The eBooks for All collection development grant opportunity allows local libraries to help build the statewide collection of eBooks.

- Allows local libraries a direct voice in what the statewide collection looks like
- Expands the statewide collection in a meaningful way
- Tailors the statewide collection to meet local needs.

# eBooks for All Requirements



Projects funded through this opportunity must:

- Come from a library that participates in the Palace Project
- Purchase materials inside of the Palace Marketplace and share those materials statewide.
- Make collection decisions in alignment with a local collection development policy.
- Apply 25 percent in contributing funds to project materials
- Afford for staff to participate in a community of practice.
