Summary

California's Career Online High School program, which is now offered in almost 780 of the state's 1,130 public libraries, complements other adult education opportunities in the state by providing an online program that can fit into the busy schedules of working and parenting adults. The program offers qualified adults ages 19 and over the chance to earn an accredited high school diploma and a career certificate.

Career Online High School has helped 2,698 California adults achieve their dream of a high school diploma. There are 887 students currently pursuing their degree through the program (as of June 30, 2022). Fifty-eight percent of students who are awarded a scholarship complete the program. Students take an average of 11 months to receive their diploma, and 76 percent of graduates surveyed indicated interest in post-secondary education.

"Finishing my high school was a goal that I had for a long time, but I wasn't able to achieve it because of my schedule. I didn't have time to go to school. For many of the 2,698 graduates, the Career Online High School program is a steppingstone that conveniently fits into their busy lives, allowing graduates to complete an important life goal and follow the path they have envisioned for themselves. For graduates in June 2022, 65 percent of graduates indicated interest in enrolling in college; 31 percent did enroll in college in areas of study like cosmetology, human resources, medical billing, business administration, criminal justice, and other programs that are likely to continue increasing a graduate's standard of living (see **Appendix D**).

Seventy-one of California's 185 library jurisdictions offer Career Online High School, comprising 779 individual libraries in 32 of California's 58 counties (see **Appendix A**).

Six large library systems were the first to implement the program: Los Angeles County Library, Los Angeles Public Library, Sacramento Public Library, San Bernardino County Library, San Diego Public Library, and San Francisco Public Library. Los Angeles Public Library has the most graduates with 733 followed by Los Angeles County Library with 521. The three newest programs are Lodi Public Library and San Benito County Free Library, which began participating in March 2022, and Mariposa County Library, starting in June 2022.

Local libraries, businesses, and nonprofits have matched the state's investment by contributing over \$3.95 million¹ in support of Career Online High School in their communities. In addition to the local cash match, libraries also commit significant staff time promoting the program, enrolling students, monitoring student progress, and organizing graduation ceremonies.

The California State Library purchased 2,740 additional scholarships in 2022 from the State's 2021-2022 fiscal year investment. A total of 3,193 scholarships are available to public libraries and their service communities.

Every month, thousands of Californians turn to their libraries to investigate the program. Between March and June 2022, the California State Library <u>Career Online High School webpage</u> had 7,187 unique visitors. When adult students are ready to pursue their dreams, their public libraries stand prepared to welcome them onto the path to a high school diploma.

The Challenge

California has more adults without a high school diploma than any other state in the nation.² About 6.3 million California residents 25 or older lack a high school diploma. Although about 89 percent of adults over 25 in the U.S. now have a high school diploma, California's rate of 84 percent is among the lowest in the nation.³

Adults without high school diplomas are often excluded from opportunities in the workplace, higher education, and career pathways. High school graduates can expect to earn about \$7,436 a year more in annual income than those without a degree. Between the ages of 18 and 64 (the average age of retirement in California)⁴, a high school graduate will make about \$342,056 more in lifetime earnings than those without a diploma.⁵ For adults struggling to juggle childcare, multiple jobs, and meeting monthly expenses, a high school diploma may be a deferred or unattainable dream. But for

A Solution

2,698 Californians, public libraries have offered a path to a high school diploma through Career Online High School.

Public libraries reach and engage adult learners and meet their needs through adult literacy centers, digital learning classes, free broadband access and computers, and career support. California's public libraries have the experience, reach, flexibility, tools, and vision to make a difference in the lives of adults who seek a high school diploma.

Career Online High School is a self-paced, online, accredited high school diploma program designed for adults ages 19 and over. Career Online High School is accredited by Cognia, a nationally recognized educational service provider that provides accreditation for primary and secondary public and private schools accepted by most post-secondary institutions. The Career Online High School program provides an affordable alternative for adults seeking a diploma but have other life responsibilities and challenges, including busy schedules, limited transportation, family responsibilities, and multiple jobs, that may limit their access to traditional high school diploma programs. For these Californians, Career Online High School is a flexible diploma pathway that expands the traditional K-12

education and adult education program models. Career Online High School is free to California adults who are awarded full scholarships by their libraries. Scholarships are valued at \$1,095 each. Students are awarded a scholarship after successfully completing a self-assessment, a preliminary coursework period, an interview, and an additional probationary coursework period.

All graduates earn a career certificate in one of ten high-demand, high-growth fields, from Childcare and Home Care Professional to Homeland Security, Commercial Driving, and Retail Customer Service, and create a resume and career portfolio to assist in the job search process after graduation.

"I'm currently working as a supervisor at a restaurant. I wanted to finish High School because I'd like to go to college someday. I learned a lot of things in the office management course that have helped me a lot in my current job position. I'd like to study more to escalate even higher in my job field."

Career Online High School's virtual learning environment supports independent learners. Core courses are aligned to national standards, and students have access to academic coaches. Adult students

may also get support from volunteer tutors and staff at their public libraries.

Unlike the General Education Development test (GED), students do not have to pay for exams. They also do not need a minimum number of credits to enroll, as is required in some adult education high school diploma programs. Students have 18 months to complete the Career Online High School curriculum and can transfer credits from their high school, GED, adult schools, and other educational experiences. The typical California learner takes 11 months to complete the program.

To help build confidence and success, students begin their coursework in a career path that interests them. There are a total of 10 career paths a student can choose from, such as childcare and education, commercial driving, office management, an introduction to manufacturing, and others. A student works to master only one course of study at a time, avoiding the overload of multiple courses combined with work and family responsibilities.



Career Online High School in California Libraries

Seventy-one California public library jurisdictions—a total of 779 libraries—offer Career Online High School to library cardholders. Almost 2,700 adults in the state have earned diplomas through their public library via Career Online High School (as of June 30, 2022), and the number of graduates grows each month as enrollees begin to finish their year-long journey.

How the Program Works



To receive a scholarship for Career Online High School, students undergo a five-step vetting process. The following process helps ensure the program is a good fit for each student before full enrollment:

- Self-assessment The self-assessment captures a potential student's contact information, prior education, schedule, access to technology, and goals for obtaining a high school diploma.
- Preliminary Coursework Two-Week Period (Prerequisite) After a Career Online High School library


staff person reviews a potential student's self-assessment, the potential student is then provided a link to access the library's individualized Career Online High School enrollment website to enroll in the preliminary coursework period, also known as the "prerequisite course." During this stage, a student will select their career path and begin a two-week prerequisite course that provides the opportunity to experience the Career Online High School program's overall pacing and workload. The process allows the student to determine whether Career Online High School will be a good fit for them and their lifestyle. A student must successfully complete this portion with a cumulative score of 70 percent or higher within two weeks of enrollment in the course. Depending on the library, the student may have multiple opportunities to take a prerequisite course if they do not initially meet the passing requirements.

- Interview When a student successfully completes the prerequisite coursework, they then schedule an interview with the library's Career Online High School staff person. During this stage, the staff person learns more about the student's goals, prior education experience, and pre-requisite experience to determine whether the student will be successful moving into the probationary coursework 30-day period.
- Probationary Coursework 30-Day Period If a student has a successful interview and believes the Career Online High School program model fits their needs and lifestyle, a student is tentatively awarded a scholarship and placed in the probationary coursework 30-day period. While in this period, students have a month of full access to the Career Online High School program and can begin formal coursework toward their diploma and career certificate. During this period, the student is also matched with their academic coach and begin generating a work plan they will use for the duration of the program. If a student successfully completes their assigned work within the 30-day period, they are fully awarded a scholarship. If a student does not complete their assigned work within this period, they have the opportunity to try again in the future and the tentatively awarded scholarship is returned to the library's available scholarship supply.
- Scholarship Award After a student successfully completes each of the four prior steps, they are
 fully awarded a scholarship to complete their high school diploma and career certificate with
 Career Online High School within 18 months of enrollment. The typical California adult enrollee takes
 11 months to graduate.

At each step, students who do not meet the program requirements may have the opportunity to begin the enrollment process again or are directed to other library and community services that may be a better fit for them.

The chart to the right shows how many students have moved through each step of the enrollment process (self-assessment, preliminary coursework two-week period, interview, additional probationary coursework 30-day period, and scholarship award) until a student is fully awarded a scholarship after 30 days and then can continue working on their full coursework toward their high school diploma and career certificate.*

Program History

Inspired by outcomes at six libraries who saw that an adult high school diploma program was a natural fit for the mission of a public library and independently introduced the program, the Governor and the Legislature approved a \$1 million pilot for the library-based Career Online High School program in the 2015-2016 fiscal year. Those funds provided 873 scholarships for public libraries to award to adult learners in their communities.

"I wanted to finish my high school diploma for myself. I have always felt self-conscious about not having it, especially since I wanted to go to college. This program gave me the knowledge, the skills, and the confidence I needed to move forward with my goals. I plan to begin

taking courses at a local community college and transfer to a four-year institution before continuing with graduate school. My goal is to become a Music college professor in the future."

Additional state purchases have been made over the past six years and for a total of 7,124 scholarships. As of June 30, 2022, there are currently 3,193 scholarships available to local libraries. The other 3,931 scholarships were allocated to California adults, 887 of whom are still enrolled in the program.

The scholarships the state buys must be matched by locally purchased scholarships that are supported by many sources: businesses, foundations, service clubs, city and county governments, and individual donors.

How to Participate

Libraries can apply to join the Career Online High School program or receive additional scholarships throughout the year. New libraries generally pay for three scholarships and receive three no-cost scholarships from the California State Library.

Libraries launching Career Online High School in their communities receive comprehensive initial training and ongoing support from Smart Horizons Career Online Education staff. Smart Horizons Career Online Education staff also maintains an online collection of resources for programs, including public relations and marketing materials.

"I wanted to finish my high school diploma so that I can prove to myself that I can be successful and accomplished. I knew receiving my diploma would cement my confidence in doing more for myself and my family. I gained a sense of responsibility and realization that It's okay to ask for help. With this weight off my shoulder, I am more determined to find a better job and look into different majors. For now, I will be pursuing a job that goes with my career certification and possibly enroll in a program to further my education."

Each month, California libraries can join an online session to share program updates and receive support from California State Library staff, fellow programs, and Smart Horizons Career Online Education staff. Smart Horizons Career Online Education and four Career Online High School California Public Libraries presented a live best practice and sharing session at the 2022 California Library Association meeting in Sacramento.

The Larger Impact

Each Career Online High School graduate is predicted to increase their median yearly earnings by an average \$7,436,6 which translates to approximately \$342,046 lifetime earnings over a 46-year period (between the ages of 18-64, the average age of retirement in California). Each year this increased earning power equates to \$376 in additional California state taxes, or about \$17,300 in additional taxes over a graduate's lifetime. Because adults without a high school diploma face the greatest social, economic, and health barriers of any educational attainment category,7 adults who receive a high school diploma will also increase governmental and taxpayer savings by relying less on social services.

Over three-quarters of California Career Online High School graduates who responded to an exit survey indicated they plan to go on to higher education, which will further increase their social, economic, and health capital. Helping just 25 adults earn their diplomas could translate into an \$8.6 million increase in those graduates' lifetime earnings and a \$432,500 lifetime increase in local state revenue with their high school diploma alone. If these 25 Career Online High School graduates decide to continue their education and attain a bachelor's degree, the total increase in lifetime earnings for these 25 individuals could total \$40.4 million with a \$2.84 million increase in local state revenue.

As of June 30, 2022, California libraries with Career Online High School have delivered the following results:

- 2,698 total graduates to date in California
- 169 adult students who are likely to graduate in the next 3 months
- **887** adult students currently active in the program (including adults likely to graduate in the next three months)
- 11 months on average to complete the program
- 76 percent of graduates expressed interest in post-secondary education during their exit interview
- 99.5 percent said they would recommend this program to others

Career Online High School is a mastery-based program, and completion of units indicates successful mastery of program contents for that unit. It does not rely on outside assessments of reading, writing, or mathematics skills.

Number of pupils who earned a diploma: 2,698 (as of June 30, 2022)

Average time to earn a diploma: 11 months

Number of graduates enrolled who subsequently enrolled in postsecondary education: Current statistics show 76 percent of students were interested in enrolling in postsecondary education. For graduates in June 2022, 65 percent were interested in enrolling in college while 31 percent of students did enroll for college in the following areas of study:

- Film and Production
- Electrical Programming
- Human Resources
- Chemistry
- Medical Billing
- Business Management

- Childcare
- Child Development
- Cosmetology
- Childcare and Education
- Business Administration
- Criminal justice

Number of graduates enrolled who subsequently gained employment or a promotion: A survey of graduates completed in 2020 showed that 53.4 percent of 73 respondents reported they received a promotion after receiving their COHS high school diploma and 31.5 percent gained a new job. In the same survey, 118 of 183 respondents, or 64.5 percent, indicated that the skills and knowledge gained from the COHS program helped in both their job and personal life.

Information on subsequent employment of graduates and changes in wages for adults who earned Career Online High School diplomas: This information is not reliably determined at graduation, although graduates responding to a survey conducted from 2020 shows that 21.4 percent of 70 respondents reported an increase in wages of \$1,000 or more per year.
